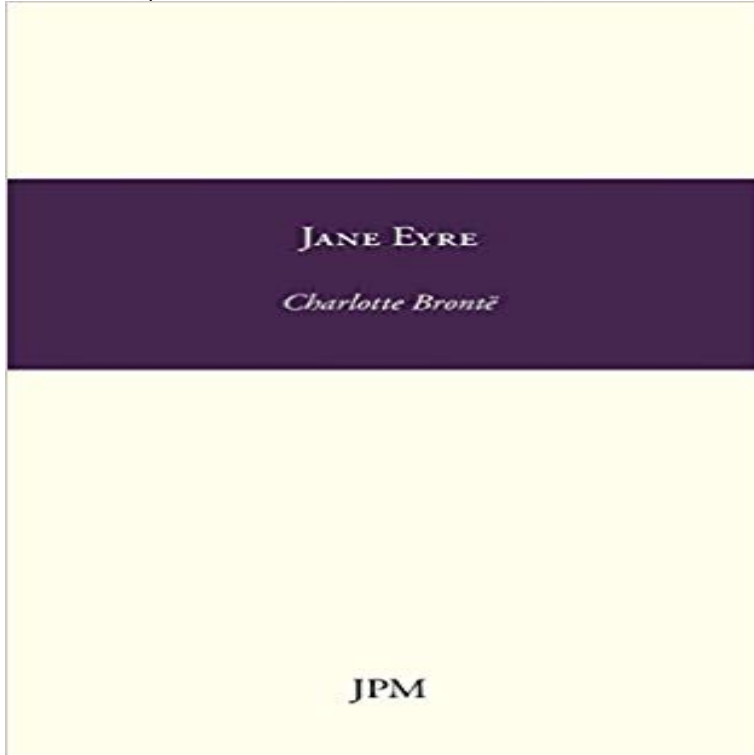


Jane Eyre
